Channel Islands:

Sark Sér The 'é' in "Sér" has to be pronounced fully and - Little Sark l'Ptit Sér clearly as one simple vowel, unlike in "sěr"!

- Big Sark l'Grân Sér

Guernsey **Ğérnezý** The silent 'e' has to be pronounced!

Jersey Jêrý

Alderney **Òriňý** may be pronounced as if written "Òrňý"

Islets:

the Etaca l'Êtà

the Grune la Grôse Grune

Countries:

England I'Angletêre may be pronounced as if written "Anglyétêre".

France la Franse

Normandy la Normandî

The peoples of the Old Norman nation and their nicknames:

the Normans lê Nŏrmân

the Sarkese lê Sérčê "lê Cŏrbîn" or "lê Lapîn"

Guernsey people lê Ğérnezyê "Iz'Âne"

Jersey people lê Jêryê "lê Crapò" or "lê C***yò"

Alderney people Iz'Òriňê "lê Vake"

Mainland Normans lê Normandê

Notes:

1) We distinguish between the Normans, lê Nŏrmân, as a whole, the Sarkese included (as opposed to the English, the French or the Bretons), and the Normans from the Mainland (Mainland Normandy, France), lê Nŏrmandê.
2) The nickname, "Cŏrbin", used especially on the other Islands, may have been intended as a slur towards the Sarkese, since ravens and crows used to be hated by the Islanders for attacking newborn lambs. That is why some families in Sark dislike it and prefer "Lapin". Nevertheless, even the nickname "Lapin" could have been a slur too.
